Definition of stability for a linear equation with constant coefficients.

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 $f(s) = s^{20} + s^{19} + \dots + s^2 + s - 10 = 0$ has a unique positive solution. Since $f(0) = -10$ and $f(1) = 10$, by the intermediate value theorem (Theorem 7.10.1), there exists a number α between 0 and 1 such that $f(\alpha) = 0$. This α is the unique positive root because $f(s) > 0$ for all $s > 0$.

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Since $x = -2y$, equations (i) and (ii) yield $-4(1 - 2y) = \mu = 2(1 - y)$, so $y = 3/5$. (B) If $\mu = 1$, then $\mu = 0$ and $x = 0$, so $y + z = 0$ and $y^2 + z^2 = a^2$, with $y = -z = a/2$. This gives the two points $(x, y, z) = (0, \pm 1/2, \mp 1/2)$. If we evaluate the objective function $x^2 + y^2 + z^2$ at each of the points we have found, we find that the two points $(x, y, z) = (0, \pm 1/2, \mp 1/2)$.

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
