The earliest known semi-permanent forts were constructed in Spain during the 2nd century BCE, but it was during the reign of Augustus (27 BCE - 14 CE) that Roman forts began to assume a standardised form. Forts varied in size with the smallest measuring under a single hectare while the larger ones could be over 50 hectares in area.

Hadrian's Wall is surely the most spectacular remnant of the Roman Empire in Britain. Stretching 73 miles from coast to coast, the wall traverses a northern frontier - from Wallsend on the River Tyne in the east, to Bowness-on-Solway in the west.

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The Saxon Shore (Latin: litus Saxonicum) was a military command of the late Roman Empire, consisting of a series of fortifications on both sides of the English Channel.It was established in the late 3rd century and was led by the "Count of the Saxon Shore".In the late 4th century, his functions were limited to Britain, while the fortifications in Gaul were established as separate commands.
